The Collect of the Day

O God, whose blessed Son came into the world that he might destroy the works of the devil and make us children of God and heirs of eternal life: Grant that, having this hope, we may purify ourselves as he is pure; that, when he comes again with power and great glory, we may be made like him in his eternal and glorious kingdom; where he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

First Reading

Joshua 24:1-3a, 14-25

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors-- Terah and his sons Abraham and Nahor-- lived beyond the Euphrates and served other gods. Then I took your father Abraham from beyond the River and led him through all the land of Canaan and made his offspring many.

"Now therefore revere the LORD, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, and in Egypt, and serve the LORD. Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."

Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the LORD to serve other gods; for it is the LORD our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the LORD drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God."

But Joshua said to the people, "You cannot serve the LORD; for he is a holy God. He is a jealous God; he will not forgive your transgressions or your sins. If you forsake the LORD and serve foreign gods, then he will turn and do you harm, and consume you, after having done you good." And the people said to Joshua, "No, we will serve the LORD!" Then Joshua said to the people,

"You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen the LORD, to serve him." And they said, "We are witnesses." He said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to the LORD, the God of Israel." The people said to Joshua, "The LORD our God we will serve, and him we will obey." So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

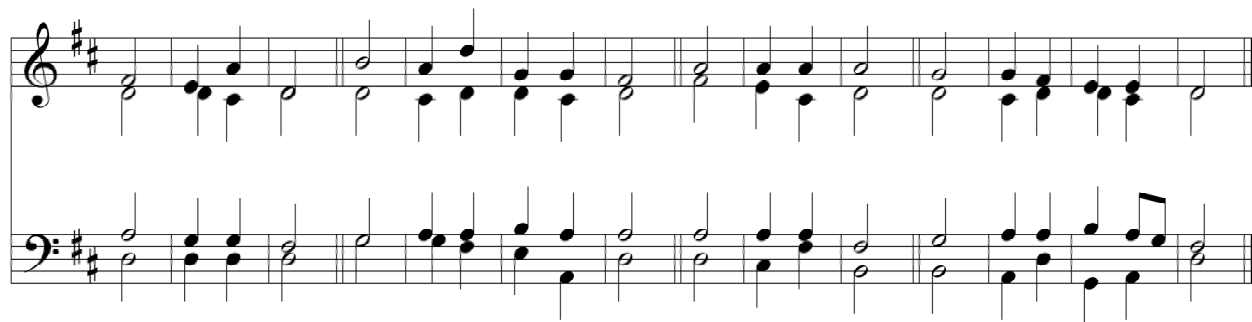

For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. Who wouldn't appreciate saving \$1 on sugar for upcoming holiday baking, Activia yogurt or Wolfgang Puck pasta sauce? How about \$2 when you buy Pampers diapers or Similac formula? \$4 on Purina ONE dog food? These savings and more are in the coupon exchange box on the credenza in the Library (by the door to the kitchen). Take as many coupons as you think you will use. If you get the newspaper, save the coupons they provide on items you don't buy and bring them in to share. This is an easy way to make your shopping dollars go further, both for your own pantry, or when you buy items to donate to our local food pantries. One favor is asked: if you notice that a coupon has expired, please pull it out and drop it in the recycling!

THE GIFT OF WARMTH...

Across from the Office, under the mailboxes (and in the church Narthex) are collection containers for gently used clothing. For the impoverished children at neighboring **Cass Street School** (K-8), we ask for school and play clothes, new underwear, new socks, new t-shirts, shirts, jeans, pajamas, etc. Warm seasonal adult-sized garments (especially new or gently used socks, gloves, hats, scarves, mufflers, jackets and coats) will be taken to **Repairers of the Breach**, Milwaukee's only daytime shelter and resource center for the homeless. Check your closets, drawers and other hiding places for these clothing items -- all will be *warmly* appreciated.
