



The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading

Ecclesiasticus 38:34b, 39:1-8

How different the one who devotes himself to the study of the law of the Most High! He seeks out the wisdom of all the ancients, and is concerned with prophecies; he preserves the sayings of the famous and penetrates the subtleties of parables; he seeks out the hidden meanings of proverbs and is at home with the obscurities of parables. He serves among the great and appears before rulers; he travels in foreign lands and learns what is good and evil in the human lot. 

The Examination

All are seated except the Ordinand, who will stand before the Bishop.

The Bishop addresses the Ordinand as follows

My brothers and sister, every Christian is called to follow Jesus Christ, serving God the Father, through the power of the Holy Spirit. God now calls you to a special ministry of servanthood directly under your bishop. In the name of Jesus Christ, you are to serve all people, particularly the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely.

As a deacon in the Church, you are to study the Holy Scriptures, to seek nourishment from them, and to model your life upon them. You are to make Christ and his redemptive love known, by your word and example, to those among whom you live, and work, and worship. You are to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world. You are to assist the bishop and priests in public worship and in the ministration of God's Word and Sacraments, and you are to carry out other duties assigned to you from time to time. At all times, your life and teaching are to show Christ's people that in serving the helpless they are serving Christ himself.

My brothers and sister, do you believe that you are truly called by God and his Church to the life and work of a deacon?

Answer I believe I am so called.

Bishop Do you now in the presence of the Church commit yourself to this trust and responsibility? Answer I do.

Bishop Will you respect and be guided by the pastoral direction and leadership of your bishop? Answer I will.

Bishop Will you be faithful in prayer, and in the reading and study of the Holy Scriptures? Answer I will.

Bishop Will you look for Christ in all others, being ready to help and serve those in need? Answer I will.

Bishop Will you do your best to pattern your life in accordance with the teachings of Christ, so that you may be a wholesome example to all people?


Answer I will.

Therefore, Father, through Jesus Christ your Son, give your Holy Spirit to Meghan; fill her with grace and power, and make her a deacon in your Church.

The Bishop continues

Make them, O Lord, modest and humble, strong and constant, to observe the discipline of Christ. Let their life and teaching so reflect your commandments, that through them many may come to know you and love you. As your Son came not to be served but to serve, may this deacon share in Christ's service, and come to the unending glory of him who, with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever.

The People in a loud voice respond

Amen.

The new Deacons are now vested according to the Order of Deacons.

The Bishop then gives a Bible to the newly ordained, saying Receive this Bible as the sign of your authority to proclaim God's Word and to assist in the ministration of his holy Sacraments.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.






The Lord's Prayer

Reception of Holy Communion





Our New Deacons

Matt Phillips



My name is Matt Phillips and I am a lifelong Episcopalian, baptized and raised in the Episcopal Church of the Holy Family in Park Forest, Illinois. Like my elder siblings, my twin brother and I grew up attending Sunday School in the parish, participating in Christmas pageants, helping at annual yard sales, and serving as acolytes. Beginning in fifth grade, my brother and I became involved in the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago's various youth ministries: from attending Camp Chicago (the diocesan summer camp), to participating in retreats such as New Beginnings and Happening. In high school, we would transition from attending these retreats as participants to serving as staff members.

It was while serving on the staff of these retreats that I first began to hear God calling me to ministry. From serving as a

small-group-leader to helping to lead worship on the music & games team, I began to recognize that the spiritual gifts God has given me are those that are suited for ordained ministry. With this recognition that God was calling me into ministry of some form, I enrolled at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in 2010 as a Religious Studies major. During my studies, I began to meet with a spiritual director who helped me to first discern that God was calling me to the priesthood.

After graduating from UIUC, I spent a year in the Episcopal Service Corps in Chicago, where I began serving as the youth minister at St. Chrysostom's Episcopal Church and the assisting chaplain at St. Chrysostom's Day School. After my initial year of service with the ESC, St. Chrysostom's and its Day School hired me in 2015 to serve in the same capacity for an additional two years. At the conclusion of these two years, I accepted a call to serve as the Director of Campus and Youth Ministries at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Milwaukee, and my (now) ex-wife and I moved to Wisconsin in early 2018. Shortly after joining St. Mark's, I began serving as the youth minister at North Shore Presbyterian Church in Shorewood as well.

While serving at St. Mark's and NSPC, I began hearing God's call to ordained ministry more clearly and entered the discernment process in the Episcopal Diocese of Milwaukee. With the Church affirming this call, I matriculated at Nashotah House Theological Seminary in 2021 where I have continued to grow in love for God and neighbor while being further formed for the priesthood. God willing and the Church consenting, I now hope to continually grow in God's love and serve in the sacred ministry.

Nathan Self



Nathan grew up, the child of a teacher and an evangelical pastor, loving the church. He was taken up with the stories of Scripture and taught to pursue a relationship with God and seek the Truth in Scripture. As he grew older, he came out and fell out of step with the conservative teachings of his youth. While in Milwaukee, Nathan was profoundly affected by two churches, Zao MKE and St Mark's. Zao and Jonah Overton, the pastor, saved his faith and showed him how Scripture and queerness and politics all went together. But it was at St Mark's where Nathan found his calling. He fell in love with the liturgy and the beauty of the rites and rituals. It was at St Mark's that God opened up a pathway to ordination and ministry and he is profoundly grateful.

Nathan did his first two years of seminary at The School of Theology at the University of the South (most folks just say Sewanee). Sewanee has a reputation of being "High Church" and majoring on knowing the prayer book and liturgy. While

there he was blessed to serve for a year at Trinity Church in Winchester. Trinity Episcopal is a great space and diverse community for a small town and taught him a lot about preaching and (as a remnant of an ACNA split) remaining faithful to your call despite the consequences. After a transformative internship with the community organizing group Greater Cleveland Congregations, Nathan transferred to Bexley Seabury in Chicago to continue working and be near his family. He will graduate in May.

Part of Nathan's call was seeing three aspects of healthy churches he wanted to cultivate. First, he saw community organizing groups like Common Ground and Greater Cleveland Congregations utilize the power of the church as an institution to develop leaders and push for a more just world. Second, he saw churches like Zao MKE stand firm in queer celebration and how that transformed his community for the better. Finally, he saw the slow and steady cultivation of community at St. Mark's Milwaukee lead people through hard times and into healing. He is excited to cultivate spaces that draw from all three of those inspirations.



Meg "Mo" Trimm

Meg "Mo" Trimm (they/she/he/xe) is an artist and storyteller with a background in program management, public speaking, and community organizing. They will graduate this May with their Masters of Divinity from Bexley Seabury Seminary Federation where they have been a proud recipient of the St. Marina Scholarship. She has a heart for people and a vibrance for life born out of personal experiences of hardship and the power of compassion, grace, and love. Their vision for engaging Christian life in the 21st century holds tradition and innovation in prayerful balance. They believe good questions can be good guides.
